Thank you again students, parents, staff, and community members for your continued support and for being good role models for our students!



Paradise Valley hosted an Honor Roll Assembly recently. Many parents had questions about the process. Below are the criteria for Honor Roll Awards, grades 4th -6th:

Distinguished Scholar - This award shall be presented to students earning all A's.

Honor Roll - This award shall be presented to students earning all A's and B's.

Bug Roll Certificate - This award shall be presented to any student who is not on Honor Roll but has brought up a grade without letting the others drop.

Top Cat Award - This award shall be presented to two students that are deserving of special recognition.

The **Perfect Attendance Award** is presented to students who have not missed even one day of school and have not been truant tardy (tardy more than 30 minutes after school start time) even one day. In other words, they have 'perfect' attendance for the whole semester.

And They're Off!

There is a reason that the ideas presented in the 1990 book by Robert Fulghum, *All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten*, have resonated so strongly for over twenty years. The simple sentiment in the title is true! What is taught in kindergarten is critical and can't be dismissed as child's play. Positive social behavior, *how* to learn, how to get along with other people, how to handle new ideas ... getting a strong handle on those concepts makes right the difference.

So don't let the cute pictures, cartoon-style graphics, and instructional aids for small hands decorating classrooms 1, 2, and 3 fool you. Paradise's three-person team knows kindergarten is serious business that requires a patient finesse that only a few possess. Ms. Costa, Mrs. Hendrix, and Mrs. Pollard are skilled experts who make it look and seem fun with games that are more than just fun games, songs that are more than just catchy tunes, and projects that provide long-lasting lessons kids will remember long past the end of the school year.

They each have thorough training and a deep well of personal and professional experience – almost 65 professional years combined! - from which they can draw to help their kids pay attention, learn, stay on track, and behave in a way that is productive individually and for the class. Each teacher points to her desire to make a positive difference as the cornerstone of her chosen profession. Mrs. Pollard cites "watching the light bulb go on and seeing excitement and confidence in children" as her favorite aspect of teaching.

Sometimes excitement comes from learning with standard materials, like books or work sheets. And, sometimes, excitement and learning come from a show-and-tell snake slithering out of its bucket while kids were outside playing at recess. There is a lesson there, too, and Ms. Costa, no doubt, taught it very well: the importance of reacting to an unexpected challenge with calm, flexible grace. Perhaps her dance skills – she started her career teaching ballet, tap, and jazz dance at her family's studio – helped her fancy foot work that day!

Another advantage the kinder team gives our kids is that they have either taught other grades or have had children of their own who attended Paradise. That means they know clearly what is expected after kindergarten and can prepare accordingly. That wider perspective will also come in handy while the kinder team collaborates on strategies for the shift to Common Core standards that will be implemented in the near future.

Kids may be nervous and a little homesick the first day. But, by the last day they are ready, confident, and smiling and hugging their teachers with tears in their eyes. Perhaps kids may not be able to articulate what they feel in June, but they know they have had a good thing going with the kinder team and they will miss it, more than they realize at such a great age!
