Project Cornerstone



Project Cornerstone is a large-scale initiative of the YMCA of Silicon Valley, which works not only with Paradise Valley Elementary, but also approximately 200 other schools and community partners. Paradise Valley's Project Cornerstone team has a long list of activities for parents and students coming up. The books that will be read in your children's classrooms are: *One* in November and *If the World Were Blind* in December.

Last month your student heard a book titled *Stand Tall, Molly Lou Melon*. The goals of this lesson are to identify caring adults in their lives, develop their personal power and believe that they have control over their lives, and increase self-esteem. Here are some activities that you can do at home to help achieve these goals:

- Boost Each Other Up: Celebrate each family member's special talents and abilities. Go around the dinner table and have each family member say one thing they like about each of the other members.
- Wall of Fame: Create a special place in your house to display items that family members are proud of. Assign a space for each family member. Make sure there is space for parents, too!
- Encourage adults at home to have frequent conversations about the caring adults in the lives of youth. Identify who they are at school, in the neighborhood, and in the family.

Paradise Valley will be hosting a one-hour parent seminar presented by a representative from the YMCA Project Cornerstone titled "No More 'Kids Will Be Kids.'" The program raises awareness about the issues of bullying and peer abuse in schools, shares strategies that help children avoid becoming victims of bullying, empowers them to STAND UP and make a difference when they see someone else being bullied. The topic of digital bullying online and through text messages on mobile phones is also addressed. It is FREE and will be held on Monday, November 18, from 6:30 - 7:30 p.m. in the Paradise Valley cafeteria.

One more item specific to Project Cornerstone and Paradise Valley ... on Monday, Nov. 4, Project Cornerstone and Funvisor are hosting a special activity: "Holiday Mail for Heroes," which is creating holiday cards that will be mailed to service members currently overseas. It dovetails nicely into Veterans Day on November 11 and Project Cornerstone Asset #9, "Service to Others." Lastly, the YMCA Project Cornerstone team is offering a six-week workshop in January at Paradise Valley in the evenings from 6:30 - 8:00 p.m. called "Take It Personally (TIP)." It exposes parents to ways to support and encourage their children to do well academically and socially. If you are interested in taking this workshop soon and/or would prefer to do so during the day, it is also scheduled at PA Walsh Elementary from 8:30 - 10:00 a.m. on Nov 5, 12, 19, Dec 3, and 10.

Independent Thinking? Fun on the Playground? It's All in a Fourth Grade Days Work.

What grade is your favorite? Do you remember one that stood out as a time when you learned something that is still with you today, or had a close friend with whom you figured out some of life's big questions, or maybe just had great "kid" fun with little or no problems that plague later tween and teen years?

Fourth grade surfaces for many as one school year that not only includes a lot of independent learning and getting a glimpse at important concepts that take students through the rest of their academic lives, but also a time when they can still be kids, still make up games on the playground, and still giggle at goofy things.

At this age students are transitioning into the upper grades, perhaps a bit nervous, but still usually excited about the nitty-gritty details that tougher projects and subjects offer. No one knows better about the fun and challenging balance that exists than Paradise Valley's fourth grade staff: Mrs. Wagner, room 24, Ms. Lewis, room 8, and Mrs. Miller, room 7. Each has a number of teaching years to her credit and brings that hard-earned wisdom to life in their classrooms' vibe and students' experiences.

Ms. Lewis points out that, "It is amazing how detailed and unique each student is. I learn something new from them all the time. They're surprised by this, but I'm not!"

While the fourth grade staff has taught other grades in their past professional experiences, each sees fourth as the one right for her because of things like the curriculum or the chance to reach kids at an age when it is possible to have a positive, long-lasting impact by giving them the tools and training they need to be successful in future years.

But let's not lose sight of the potential for goofiness that makes kids laugh, either. Early on in Mrs. Wagner's career she hosted a "pooch in the park" day with students, their parents and family pets. Unbeknownst to her a third grade teacher also planned a park day with students and a group of miniature goats. At least one dog got loose, charged after the goats, and started a free-for-all with kids, dogs, parents (hopefully good-humored ones), and goats. So school can be like a chaotic zoo, and Mrs. Wagner knows that all too well!

Now back to the serious stuff. While reading, writing and math are still a critical part of instructional time, teachers can more readily expand on science and social studies concepts because kids are able to take on detailed or critical thinking requirements of such work. The kids in fourth grade are developing into citizens with a great deal to offer. The staff now in place is the right team to help them discover and reach their own growing potential!
